The apostle Paul wanted to go to Rome, and before going, he sent a letter to the Christian community there.

The Christians in Rome came from a variety of different social, cultural and religious backgrounds.

There was some tension among them due to misunderstandings, and even some rivalry.

Paul knew that all of them were acting out of love for God, and even though they did things differently, he told them they shouldn't judge the others, but welcome one another and build up the community, accepting one another just as Jesus did with us.

This Word of Life is an invitation to listen and learn from others, to let go of your defense mechanisms, to be open to change, to welcome diversity with respect and love.

Paul does not suggest uniformity but rather a community rich in diversity and unity.
