We asked Vera:

The world, a home

"Many times we hear people say: «Those foreigners should go back home!» But where is their home? **The world is their home!**

We live in a globalized world. Everyone says that they are happy about globalization. Therefore, everyone's «home» is the world, which means they can go wherever they want.

People say these things out of fear. Instead you young people are not afraid because you love others. You are not even afraid to say good things about people from other countries and you tell your friends, classmates and family there is nothing to be afraid of. (...) Just think of how you would like to be treated if you had to go and live in a foreign country, in another nation, in another city.

You would certainly be happy if someone welcomed you and it you didn't have to be afraid of anyone, instead of having people look at you with suspicion. So we have to speak well about them, too, and welcome them."
