The people of the island welcomed them and lit a huge bonfire so that they could gather around it and warm themselves. And then they took care of them for three months until they could leave again.

Here is what Chiara Lubich suggests:

God loves them?

"Jesus showed us that loving others means to welcome them as they are. That's how he welcomes each one of us. Accept others as they are, with their ideas, defects, likes and dislikes, and even their diversity.

[...] Make room for them in our hearts, getting rid of any judgements or prejudice, and especially any thought of rejecting them. [...]

In this way we are laying the basis to make humanity one family. Nothing makes God happier than to see true unity among people.

When we are united, we attract the presence of Jesus among us and he transforms everything."
