

Both of them welcome Jesus who is passing by, but they do it in a differently.






Mary places herself at Jesus' feet, listening, instead Martha let's herself be taken by things to prepare in order to serve him.

"A prayer that does not lead you to practical action for your neighbour— the poor, the sick, those in need of help, a neighbour in difficulty — is a sterile and incomplete prayer. But, in the same way, when ..." we are "attentive only to doing, things gain in importance, functions, structures, and we forget the centrality of Christ. When time is not set aside for dialogue with him in prayer, we risk serving ourselves and not God present in our needy brother and sister."
